This portion would then become part of the right-of-way and it is Geisinger's intent to have same deeded over to the township at some point in time.

The widening project also involves placing sidewalks and curbs and piping Blecher's Run with underground pipe to south of Boyer's Store to repair the erosion problem. Geisinger has contacted the Army Corp of Engineers, Montour County Soil Conservation District and Penn Dot regarding their proposed plans.

If the project meets the approval of the board, Mr. Davies requests a letter in support of the project be submitted to Penn Dot along with a resolution, which must be passed by the Supervisors. Because the prepared resolution appeared non committing to our solicitor, Mr. Peters, he advised the board that they could act on same during tonight's meeting, and motion to adopt the resolution was made by Mr. Earlston, seconded by Mr. Buehner, the board also agreed to submit a letter in support of the project as requested.

#### PERSONNEL MATTERS

- 8. 29 U.S.C.A. Section 1002(32) provides that a "govern-mental plan" means a plan established or maintained for its employees by the Government of the United States, by the government of any state or political subdivision thereof, or by any ongoing or instrumentality of any of the foregoing.
- 9. As a matter of general contract law, contracts are to be construed most strictly against the writer in the case of an ambiguity.

#### CONCLUSIONS

## Medical Insurance Issue

- 1. Article 22 of the 1987-1988-1989-1990-1991-1992 Police Contracts pertaining to Retirees Health Insurance Benefits arose after Mr. Hunter's retirement on March 5, 1984.
- 2. Article 22, as referred to, is silent as to whether it applies to officers who retired prior to its enactment (i.e. Mr. Hunter), or whether it was meant for officers and their dependents who retire after that date. Article 22 was included in the 1987 Police Contract, and all subsequent years thereafter.
- 3. The initial agreement recognized the MTPOA as the exclusive representative of the police officers in the Township, said agreement specifically excluded the Chief.
- 4. All subsequent Police Contracts entered into by the Township and the MTPOA are silent on the issue on whether the Chief of Police is to be excluded.
- 5. It is not clear from the written instruments whether the Township and the MTPOA intended to permanently exclude the Chief of Police from all Police Contracts entered into between the parties between 1985 and 1992.
- 6. If it was the intention of the parties to exclude the Chief from all Police Contracts during the aforesaid time period, there apparently is no written policy pertaining to employment, retirement or benefit issues insofar as they would apply to a Chief of Police.

- 7. Since the initial 1985 Police Contract provided that a retired police officer could obtain major medical benefits through the Township by reimbursing the Township for the premiums was subsequently expanded to provide for the Township's payment for those benefits and all dependents of a retired police officer as set forth in Article 22 (supra), it is likely that Mr. Hunter, as a Supervisor of the Township at that time, was instrumental in implementing Article 22.
- 8. It is possible that a court would determine that a "Chief of Police", in the absence of any other written documentation, is governed by the Police Contracts entered into between the parties between 1985 and 1992, despite the initial agreement where the Township recognized the MTPOA as the exclusive bargaining agent for the police and the Township, which said agreement specifically excluded the Chief.
- 9. Because Mr. Hunter was indeed instrumental in the implementation of Article 22 after he became a Supervisor in the Township, I do not believe that he can subsequently argue that the provision should apply to him and his family for free medical benefits where Article 22 does not specifically refer to officers who retired prior to the advent of Article 22.

THEREFORE, it is my opinion that the Township is not responsible for the payment of major medical coverage for Mr. Hunter and/or his dependents.

Parenthetically, I would also add that Article 22, in the long run, could prove to be a tremendous financial burden on the Township and probably should be re-evaluated and, if possible, eliminated, at least in its current, "open-ended" status.

## Pension Issues

1. The Township, perhaps as a result of poor communications, failed to purchase an adequate annuity for Mr. Hunter beyond age sixty-five (65). The Township must provide retirement benefits for the life of this plan participant, which will involve purchasing an additional annuity for Mr. Hunter.

- 2. The Township Code does not provide that the Township must purchase an annuity for the survivors of a plan participant.
- 3. The Police Contracts entered into between MTPOA and the Township from 1986 through 1992 make no provision for joint and survivor annuities or "widow's" benefits.
- 4. The Mahoning Township Retirement Plan is a "govern-mental plan "as defined" in 29 U.S.C.A. Section 1002(32) and is therefore not subject to the joint and survivor annuity provisions set forth in 29 U.S.C.A. Section 1055(d).
- 5. In light of the foregoing considerations, the Township does not have to purchase a joint and survivor annuity (widow's benefit) for the spouse of Mr. Hunter.

Parenthetically, if the Township opts to provide a joint and survivor annuity for Mr. Hunter's spouse, it does so at the risk of setting a dangerous precedent.

September Police Report was given and monies turned over from the District Magistrate's office.

OLD BUSINESS: Request for township funding toward the Hess Recreational Field by Danville Borough Council was again addressed. The Board of Supervisors had requested figures be made available from Danville Borough's budget regarding the Hess Field, and since we have not received these figures, Mr. Buehner motioned and Mr. Earlston seconded tabling the issue completely.

The Board, motion Mr. Earlston, second Mr. Buehner, instructed the solicitor to advertise with intent to adopt the Fire Ordinance presented at a previous meeting by Fire Chief, Robert Eyer. The minutes of the previous meeting of January 11, 1993 were approved by the board.

Mr. Diehl was interested in any discussion on one of his projects for Dr. & Mrs. Bhatia, however, since nothing pertaining to the Bhatia's was under discussion tonight, but will be discussed at a Public Hearing of the Zoning Hearing Board, February 8, Mr. Diehl remained as an interested observer.

Deerfield plans were under lengthy discussion by the Township Engineer, John Maileue, Deerfield Engineer, Robert Weaver and Deerfield Developers. Mr. Maileue stated that after reviewing Deerfield's plans one significant problem, detention pond discharge, remains in question. He requests, as had been done previously by the Board, that Deerfield Engineers administer drafting changes, wherein the detention pond outfall would be moved 75 feet upstream. This would require no actual physical work, just an adjustment on the plans. Deerfield Engineer, Robert Weaver, will pull spot elevations to see if this would involve redesign of the entire basin. In the meantime, on the advice of the Township's engineer, the board agreed to allow permits for Lots 7, 8, 9 & 10 within the Deerfield Development, no other permits will be issued until retention basins are in and stabilized.

Some heated discussion ensued between Deerfield Developer, Jack Curry, Township Engineer Maileue and the board, as Mr. Curry questioned the delay of plan approval, once it had been submitted to the Board of Supervisors for their perusal. Attorney Wagner, another Deerfield Developer, soon ended the discussion, summing it up as water under the bridge. He, Attorney Wagner, then asked Mr. Maileue whether or not anything else on the Deerfield plans needed to be addressed, to which Mr. Maileue replied, "No".

Later on in the meeting Mr. Curry did apologize for his outburst, which led to a bit more arguing, until such time as he was dismissed by Chairman Woodruff.

With new County Planning Commission law in tact, the Board of Supervisors recently submitted a letter to the County Planning Commission voicing their disapproval of the proposed project of Matt Zoppetti located in Cooper Township, as proper Stormwater Management plans were not submitted and since stormwater runoff from the project will affect Sechler's Run.

Mr. Woodruff stated that the Board of Supervisors would inform the County Planning Commission in writing that we want to see a stormwater management plan in place before granting our approval. If the county then approves these plans as submitted without proper stormwater management plans, it would be against our wishes.

Paul Diehl then posed questions concerning the proposed Kreisher Development and access to streets within same, the questions he posed were of a civil nature and could not be addressed by the board or their engineer.

OLD BUSINESS: Zoning Officer turned over his year end report including totals for 1992. He then stated that the Planning Commission met this evening at 5:15 and tentatively approved plans submitted by Maria Joseph Manor for "The Meadows", these are, however, preliminary plans. Mr. Adler stated, as recorded in his letter of May 10, 1993, which was hand delivered to the board this morning, that he understood that the Mahoning Township Authority had approved his Water & Sewer plans for the development, however, he was informed that the Board of Supervisors may reject same.

Mr. Woodruff indicated that the Board of Supervisors concerns are with adequate fire protection to the development. At this point in the conversation, Robert Eyer, Fire Chief interjected that the concerns of the Fire Department are to be sure that an adequate amount of water would be available to the development, so that the volunteer fire department would not have to boost pressure on a hydrant to adequately put out a fire in the development, as the department could be held liable for this damage, which may occur to the entire system, as a result of boosting pressure on a hydrant.

Mr. Adder questioned if other sections in the community must also comply with the fire company's requests, and stated that he could not understand why, in fact, on April 19, 1993 the Water & Sewer Authority had given their approval of the plans for the Edgewood Development if there still is some question about same.

Mr. Woodruff explained that the plans submitted to the Water & Sewer Authority have not been received or reviewed by the Board of Supervisors or their engineer. The Authority, he explained, is not in the fire protection business, and therefore, the township must then assume the responsibility in this case for adequate fire protection.

In order to comply with the Township's requirements, Mr. Adler asked what the Township Engineer would need and he was told by Mr. Mailleue, who is the Township's Engineer, that he would like to see water distribution plans, possibly including flow calculations, for the development. If copies of the plans are not available from the Authority's office in the morning, Mr. Woodruff will contact Mr. Day, who will in turn supply the information. Township Engineer stated that once in his hands, the plans would be a matter of a couple of hours to review.

Regarding the Sewage Planning Modules, Mr. Mailleue then voiced concern with whether or not a delineation was done on the wetlands present on this property, as no narrative was received on same. Mr. Adler stated that the Wetlands, which appear on the map are man made water run-off from another property owner, and once the water is re-routed the wetlands will no longer exist. However, Mr. Mailleue insisted that in order for the township to comply with state regulations and before we can complete our portion of the Planning Modules, the issue of wetlands delineation must be addressed.

Agreeing to the request of the Township engineer, Mr. Adler questioned what proper procedure would be when submitting plans to the township, since water & sewer is supposed to be the first order of business, and approval for same was given over one month ago, what would his next step then be, however, no definite answer was given as to what is considered proper procedure.

Mr. Buehner motioned in favor of authorizing and approving for payment the bills on

the checklists of April 30, 1993 for payroll, May 10, 1993 for the bills and also included a motion to adjourn, Mr. Woodruff seconded the motion.

The community assistance payments will be distributed to the County, who will in turn distribute portions to the Danville Area School District and Mahoning Township taxing authorities and will cover the years 1993, 1994 and 1995.

From this proposal School Board President Carolyn Nadel stated the district would receive \$356,000 for 1993. Chairman Gill noted the County's payment for 1993 of \$108,000, and Chairman Woodruff's 1993 figure for Mahoning Township was \$69,969.

Attorney Peters explained that negotiating a compromise agreement was in the best interest of all taxing bodies, as possible cost of litigation of this matter could have been very costly. Estimate for experts necessary in the litigation process could run

approximately \$80,000 each.

In an effort to reach a compromise, Commissioner Gill stated that Geisinger had been very cooperative by providing a great deal of vital information necessary for analyzation. She stated that in her opinion Geisinger has been a truly "good neighbor" throughout this process.

Mr. Ackerman expressed his favor of this equitable approach to avoiding litigation costs and allowing Geisinger to retaining its real estate tax exempt status while better assisting with the burdens of the local community.

As Mrs. Gill called for each individual taxing body to vote on the agreement, Dave Ralis of the Press Enterprise, went on record both as a citizen and a reporter, and charged the separate boards with violation of the Sunshine Law. He presented Mrs. Gill a copy of the Sunshine Law with appropriate portions pertaining to violation highlighted.

The three governing bodies separately, as well as the Board of Assessment Appeals then proceeded with roll call votes as to whether or not they were in favor of entering into this agreement with Geisinger. All votes for each separate board were moved and seconded in favor, roll call vote proved the decision was unanimous.

esidents of Bald Top were present to request that the Board take over Overlook and Timberwood Drives. Spokesman for the group, Howard Hughes read the letter serving as formal request from these citizens. Attached to the letter were forty-five (45) signatures of homeowners agreeing to the take over. These residents have made improvements totaling in excess of \$150,000 in an effort to bring these roads up to township specifications. Mr. Woodruff stated that he is aware of the improvements made to these roads, and it was his suggestion to contact our Penn Dot representative, Roy Weaver to assure that the roads would also meet the standards, whereby they would be eligible for Liquid Fuel funds. Zoning Officer submitted plans for the Edgewood Residential Sub-Division, he stated that the Planning Commission have approved same and would recommend that the Board of Supervisors also approve.

Mr. Earlston questioned whether or not the water system would be adequate to the development, as questions were raised earlier on hydrant pressures, however, Attorney Brittain answered on behalf of the developer, that the system will be installed as originally designed, as those plans have been approved by the Mahoning Township Municipal Authority.

At that time, Mr. Buehner questioned a possible conflict of interest in that PSC Engineering firm designed the plans for the water system in the Edgewood Development, and then also approved these plans in their capacity as the engineering firm for the Mahoning Township Municipal Authority. Mr. Buehner is concerned that residents of the Edgewood Development could come back on the Board of Supervisors, if adequate water pressure cannot be supplied, he then asked for the advice of our solicitor on this matter.

Attorney Peters stated that the pressure on the hydrants are the responsibility of the designing engineer, however, hypothetically, if problems occur within the development, residents could sue everyone involved. He stated that the Board of Supervisors do not have control over the Municipal Authority's decision to accept the plan, further, this sub-division has been reviewed and approved by other necessary agencies and comes from the Planning Commission with their recommendation for approval. He then recommended that the board solicit the advice of their Zoning Officer.

Nelson Young explained that during an open meeting Mr. Thomas Mertz, Chairman of the Mahoning Township Municipal Authority stated that what this discrepancy amounts to is a difference of opinion between the engineer for the Authority and the engineer for the Township, however, the engineer for the Authority has the last word.

Mr. Woodruff explained to other members of the Board that they should take into

consideration the overall design of the development, also being aware that the development has gained the approval of other pertinent commissions and agencies, and does come to us recommended by our Planning Commission. It was the decision of the board to review all bids and to award at the next regular meeting on March 28, 1994.

NEW BUSINESS: Mr. Earlston motioned and Mr. Buehner seconded in favor of advertising and holding semi-annual road inspection on Saturday, April 30, 1994 commencing at 8:00 AM. Date was also set to hold annual dumpster day Saturday, April 23, 1994 from 7:00 AM to 5:00 PM.

Mr. Buehner motioned in favor of our solicitor sending a letter to our representatives opposing the fact that Montour County was excluded from receiving reimbursement for snow removal, while other surrounding counties will receive monies. Geisinger attempting to create a new entrance or exit to their facilities somewhere in this section of Bloom Street. 2. With parking already limited, where would apartment residents park or where would company coming to visit those who residents find parking? 3. Would permit parking depreciate the value of their homes? 4. In the event that a person without a permit took your parking space, could a resident then call a tow truck and have the vehicle towed?

Chief Berthelsen entered the discussion and explained that towing is done in only emergency situations, and residents could not simply call a tow truck. He then informed the group that his concerns, and part of his job, is to look toward public safety and alert the Board of Supervisors of problem areas, such as this one, so together we can find an effective solution to the problem.

Mr. Woodruff reiterated that we are concerned with what is in the best interest of our residents there, and that much more research needs to be done before a final plan

188 can be agreed upon, but prior to any decisions being made, residents will be aware of what is proposed, and will be involved in public comment periods. He again requested that this concerned group give us the opportunity to review this matter further.

Thank you for your letter dated March 25, 1994 as addressed to Dwight Harris. Your inquiry has been forwarded to the legal office for review and response.

You asked for an explanation as to how the investments in the INVEST Program are collateralized. Any bank certificate of deposit, security, or repurchase agreement which is entered into by Treasury for the INVEST Program is fully collateralized. The same is true of tripartite repurchase agreements. The custodian of most of the collateral is CoreStates Bank, which serves as custodian of bank CDs, securities and repurchase agreements. The custodian for most of our tripartite repurchase agreements is Chemical Bank.

You may also wish to learn that collateral is held in the following name: Pennsylvania Treasurer's INVEST Program for Local Governments. Therefore, it is not held in the name of any individual INVEST participant.

Police Report for March was presented by the secretary, in the absence of the Chief of Police, who is away for training.

Zoning Officer reported April fees totalling \$170.80 for a total value of permits issued at \$103.840.

OLD BUSINESS: The board voted in favor of accepting the low bid from HRI, Inc. for supplying the township with bituminous material for the calendar year 1994. Motion in favor Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston.

NEW BUSINESS: Exoneration requests of Statewide Tax Recovery were granted by the board, motion in favor Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston.

The board approved sending recycling committee members to an upcoming DCA sponsored seminar at the township's expense, motion to approve Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston.

Following semi-annual Road Inspection, the supervisors sought the advice of our Penn Dot Municipal Services Representative, Roy Weaver, on several problem areas. It was estimated that Timberwood would require 250 ton of BCBC @ \$6,750 with a seal coat @\$1,680. Paving on Clinic Road and a section of Toby Run would require approximately 250 ton of ID-2A @ \$7,000. Also suggested was another section of Toby Run 3/10 of a mile long \$2,280. Because this estimate goes over what we had budgeted for resurfacing for 1994 by approximately \$7,000 to \$8,000, the board motioned in favor of proceeding with the repairs, as the work required is necessary. Mr. Earlston motioned in favor, Mr. Buehner seconded.

Due to road breakage, Mr. Woodruff requested that our solicitor take the necessary action to change our current road specifications from 2" of BCBC to 4 1/2" of BCBC. Also requested was a five year guarantee on roads

196 within a new development, upon 100% completion of the development. As this would likely be handled by a bond, our solicitor will work with our Zoning Officer in the preparation of same.

Mr. Woodruff expressed his concern with the bill supported by Senator Helfrick introduced for Danville Borough to purchase land from the Danville State Hospital. The land, which is in Mahoning Township, located along Route 11, will be used to stockpile sludge. Woodruff said that he resents the fact that Danville Borough officials did not come to us to discuss or explain their plans for this land, and that township officials have collected what information they currently have by reading it in the newspapers.

Due to the site being located directly along Route 11, the board of supervisors is concerned with oder, possible contamination, runoff and what sort of impression this would give to people travelling through our small community. They also feel that not only the residents of Mahoning Township, but also Danville Borough residents should be concerned with what effect this sludge would have on the surrounding properties, such as the High School, ball fields, rec center, retirement community, restuarants and other businesses.

Finally, Mr. Woodruff stated on behalf of the entire board, who were all in agreement, that public hearings should be held, so that everyone can be informed and all issues can be addressed. He then invited public comment, either pro or con, be addressed to the municipal building.

Zoning Officer, Nelson Young, suggested that due to the proximity of two streams also located in this area, DER be contacted regarding the run-off from this sludge. The board agreed that this was a good idea.

Tom Brady, Third Ward Councilman and Collin Stump, acting as liason officer for the Danville Borough's Sewer Committee, both stated that they were not prepared to comment tonight, but did attend our meeting to find out exactly what our concerns are, so that they can pass this information on to Danville Borough Council.

Once again Mr. Woodruff, supported by the other two board members, reiterated that planning should have started with Mahoning Township.

OLD BUSINSS UPDATES: CATV FRANCHISE: Meeting between CATV and our solicitor will take place next week, once the President of the cable company has returned from vacation. FURNACE: Estimates for the furnace, damaged by fire almost two months ago, were sent to our insurance carrier today.

NEW BUSINESS: Two Day LTAP seminar and DCA seminar on Regional Police Services are scheduled for the near future. The board voted in favor of sending anyone interested to either of the seminars offered. Mr. Earlston motioned and Mr. Buehner seconded the motion.

She was instructed to transfer \$100,000 of the General Savings over to the INVEST 001 account.

Due to the Township having been cited by DER last year for burning in the pit, the Board has been looking into alternative methods of disposing of brush. They found that we could stockpile brush and rent a chipper from the landfill at \$65 per hour. They thought, perhaps, we could purchase a chipper through the Council of Governments, and that all COG members could share the use of same, but to no avail. Finally, they had two chippers of different sizes, ranging in price from \$14,000 to \$18,000, demonstrated. This seems to be the most feasible way to go, as it will aid in the disposal of Christmas trees, upon collection of same, cut down on time for the Street Department, when hauling brush, and make our own mulch. Once a chipper has been purchased, we may also be eligible to obtain grant money. Specifications were drawn up for the chipper, and by motion of Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston, bid opening for the purchase of a chipper was scheduled for our next regular meeting, and will be advertised as same or June 13, 1994.

The regular semi-monthly meeting of the Mahoning Township Board of Supervisors was held this evening at the Township Municipal Building at 6:30 PM.

The minutes of the previous meeting of May 23, 1994 were approved by the Board and Treasurer's Report for the month of May was accepted by motion of Mr. Earlston, second Mr. Buehner.

Chief Berthelsen turned in the Police Department's May 1994 report along with fines collected by the District Magistrate for May. The Chief solicited donations on behalf of the Police Department's team, who will be participating in the American Cancer Society's Walk/Run for Life in honor of our Former Chief Donald Hunter, Jr. Chief Berthelsen explained that his department hopes to be able to raise \$5,000. The Board by motion of Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston agreed to donate \$150 to the cause.

Zoning Officer reported total value of permits issued for May in the amount of \$212,500 with total fees collected of \$540.30. He explained that the Planning Commission met this date at 5:15 and reviewed sub-division plans of William Kreisher and a minor sub-division of the DeGuzis property. Both sub-divisions were approved by the Planning Commission, however, the DeGuzis sub-division is contingent upon receipt of letter of approval of the Planning Modules submitted to DER. The Planning Commission did recommended both plans for approval by the Board of Supervisors. Mr. Woodruff stated that he is very familiar with both of these plans and he would recommend that the Board of Supervisors act on the recommendation of the Planning Commission. BUILDING REPAIR ESTIMATES: Because we are running into big numbers trying to secure repair estimates, Mr. Woodruff requested permission from the board to look into the feasibility of costs to erect a new building, and the board gave their approval.

NEW BUSINESS: Exoneration request of Statewide Tax Recovery of the Per Capita tax for non-residency was granted by motion of Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston.

Mr. Earlston motioned in favor of interested parties attending the next upcoming DCA seminar to be held July 27 in Williamsport. The seminar deals with running effective meetings, Mr. Buehner seconded.

Natalie Duy submitted a letter requesting that the board agree to take over Woodhill Road, once all the necessary work has been done to bring the road up to Penn Dot specifications. The board seemed in favor of the request, as Mr. Woodruff advised that he, along with Peter Uhl, Registered Surveyor, and Roy Weaver of the PA Department of Transportation all walked this road along with Mrs. Duy, and she is completely aware of the improvements that need to be made, before we could consider this road for take over. Her letter to the Board also states that she is in favor of making the necessary improvemments, however, at this time, our solicitor advised the Mrs. Duy should submit her plans in writing before any formal action is taken.

After twenty-two years of service, our garden tractor must be replaced. Prices for a newer model secured by phone are in the \$4,000 range, solicitor advised three bids be secured in writing.

Danville Borough has requested monies to help maintain baseball fields used by not only Danville Borough children, but all surrounding municipalities. Mr. Woodruff is of the opinion that these monies, if agreed to, should be in the form of a donation, not an assessment.

This discussion was tabled and will be addressed at our next meeting.

Recycling Committee has drawn up a sample newsletter, which will be distributed to both newspapers present. Mr. Woodruff explained that the committee met with the board this evening and they expressed alot of good ideas they have aout putting a recycling program together for Mahoning Township. The newsletter should give them some feedback as far as what the residents thoughts might be on this subject.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Dennis Adams of 5 Millwood Drive as a taxpayer and voter in Mahoning Township once again requested help with the water run off problem he has been experiencing for over a year now within the Millwood Development. He was concerned that the board would not allow him to divert the water from around his property into the roadway. Mr. Woodruff explained that to redirect water into the roadway causes damage to the streets and that it is our goal to keep water off the streets.

Mr. Adams then explained that his neighbor did exactly what he was told he could not do. However, Mr. Woodruff explained that once he became aware of the pipe installed by the neighbor, he(Mr. Woodruff) requested that the pipe be taken out, this was done and a french drain was installed so that the water would exit into the french drain. Mr. Adams is concerned that the pipe was removed, but the water was never rerouted through the french drain, and he is still experiencing water damage to his basement and driveway. Mr. Woodruff advised that he would go out and look over the situation.

Mr. Young, Zoning Officer stated that the water problem could be a winter spring, as there are many of these throughout the township.

Solicitor advised that if this is a water problem caused by an artificial source, then this matter may be a civil matter between Mr. Adams and his neighbor.

Mr. Woodruff reiterated that he would go and again look over the situation.

Mr. Earlston motioned in favor of authorizing and approving the bills on the list of Mav 27 and June 10, 1994 for payroll, June 1994 for the bills, and also to adjourn, Mr. Buehner seconded.

Mr. Woodruff advised that he has recently sent letters to Representative Belfanti and Senator Helfrick requesting financial aid with costly repairs to Bald Top Road, and assistance to perhaps, purchase the State Hospital Barn and some acreage from the State Hospital. We have had no word from Representative Belfanti, but we have been advised by phone from the office of Senator Helfrick, that Bald Top Road is a township road, and since we do already receive liquid fuel monies for same, no other funds would be available through the state. We were also advised that the Danville State Hospital's sale of land to the Danville Borough will go through. Next, we will contact Congressman Kanjorski's office.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Dr. Robert Lasek stated that he was present this evening to set the record straight concerning the water run-off problem between his house at 3 Millwood Drive and that of his neighbor, Mr. Dennis Adams of 5 Millwood Drive, who presented his views at our last meeting. Dr. Lasek advised that he has tried to alleviate this problem by working with his neighbors, but has been met with constant harrassment.

On April 28, 1993, he had Greenwood Nursery install pipe and stone, however, on September 9, 1993, at the township's request, the pipe and stone were removed and the area covered with dirt and seeded. Also, in 1993, at his own expense and with the cooperation of his neighbor, Mr. Adams, Dr. Lasek had a Perpetual Drainage Agreement drawn up by his attorney. Once the document was ready for signatures, the Adams' refused to sign.

Dr. Lasek does not know what else he can do, and since he is of the opinion that an underground spring has surfaced in the township right-of-way, so causing this run-off problem, he suggests that the township refer to and comply with the original township plans of the Millwood Development, which call for the installation of a swale down through the right-of-way, which will divert the flow of water.

Zoning Officer, Nelson Young agrees that this is possibly a winter spring, and to install the swale, as had been previously suggested almost a year ago, would alleviate the problems, however, at the time that this was suggested, there was some objection to installing the stone swale, as people just did not want stone swales on their properties.

Paul J. Diehl, Contractor, building in the Millwood Development, is familiar with the problems being experienced by these two families, and was on hand to offer his views, however, most of what he brought up revolved around a police incident involving damage to one resident's mailbox. Mr. Adams spoke only to say that in his opinion the harrassment is the other way around.

Because, until this evening, Solicitor Peters was unaware that an underground spring exists, he now recommends that the township engineer be contacted and he, John Mailleue, along with Mr. Young, Mr. Woodruff, Jim Barbarich, the developer, and the two property owners can all get together and arrive at a practical solution to this matter.

Before Mr. Woodruff entertained a motion to pay the bills for the month and to adjourn, he asked if anyone had any other business to be brought before the board. It was at this time that Paul Diehl questioned the board as to whether Hill Street was a township road or a private road. He was told that it was private and has not been turned over to the township. Immediately he requested an explanation as to why, if this is a private road, the township plows, cinders, tars and chips a private road. Further, he stated that the township would not supply him with cinders this winter, when his father suffered a heart attack and needed emergency treatment, and so he wondered, how it is that township can plow this private road.

Mr. Woodruff stated that this had been done for as long as he can remember and he could not tell him exactly why, however, he stated that he would make note of the fact that Mr. Diehl does not want to have Hill Street plowed. Mr. Diehl reiterated his point, stating that he feels, if you plow one road, you should plow all the roads, not just a select few. And this was so noted.

Mr. Earlston then motioned in favor of paying the bills for June 1994, June 24, 1994 for payroll and also to adjourn, Mr. Buehner seconded.

OLD BUSINESS: Art Peters advised the board that the proposed CATV franchise agreements will be prepared in their final form and will, perhaps, be ready in time for our next regular meeting.

Mr. Peters also advised that the Danville Municipal Authority has requested a copy of our Drought Contingency Ordinance, as they are in the process of preparing thier own ordinance for handling emergency water situations. The Board agreed and a copy will be forwarded to the Borough through our solicitor.

The Board requested the advice of the solicitor to handle a problem we are experiencing throughout the township. Numerous calls have been received from residents concerned with Special Edition newspapers being thrown on their properties. The newspaper has been contacted many times by our office and that of our Police Department, but to no avail. Since we have no specific ordinance against this, our solicitor suggests that our board, along with our Chief of Police work together, with him to draw up a hand tailored ordinance to handle this situation.

BID OPENING - USED CUB CADET GARDEN TRACTOR - 6:40 PM: For sale by the township, the used cub cadet brought one bid from Nelson D. Young in the amount of \$165, motion in favor to accept Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston.

BID OPENING - 1,500 GPM PUMPER FIRE TRUCK - 6:45 PM: Four bids were received they are as follows:

As we are not in a position to accept or reject bids at this point, nor do we know how long it will take to go through the complete proposals, the Board of Supervisors turned the bid proposals over to the Fire Review Board. All bidders will be notified

and proper notice advertised for a specific date and time when the bid will be awarded.

OLD BUSINESS: The Board agreed to obtain bids to erect a new township municipal building. Specifications will be forwarded to the solicitor, who will then advertise same.

We are in receipt of information from Penn DOT on an approximate cost to bring Woodbine Lane up to specifications, whereby it could then be taken over by the township. Detailed estimates will be distributed to the board and their solicitor for the perusal of all. Once familiar with the proposed improvements, this matter will be discussed further.

NEW BUSINESS: Planning Modules and a Resolution for Plan Revision on the Edgewood Development to increase the lot amounts from 17 to 22 were adopted, motion in favor Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston. Plans were reviewed and approved by all other necessary agency's prior to being submitted to our board for review.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Present at our meeting this evening were Mr. & Mrs. David Harvey, who explained that due to a water main break, near their home on Reedy Street the evening of June 3, 1994, they sustained a loss of approximately \$2,500, when water from the leak destroyed the contents of their basement. Claims filed with both the Municipal Authority's insurance carrier and their own homeowner's insurance carrier have been denied. The Harvey's request help from the Board of Supervisors to obtain reimbursement for their damages. Their purpose at the meeting this evening is twofold, in that, as Mrs. Harvey stated, given the same circumstances, other township residents could be faced with a similar situation, and they should be aware of that possibility.

Attorney Peters advised the Harvey's that they should take this matter before the board of the Mahoning Township Authority, who regularly meet the third Monday of each month at 7:00 PM. He stated that because the Mahoning Township Authority is an operating authority, they do handle their own affairs, as a separate entity, and he felt, that perhaps, they could once again present the claim for payment through their insurance carrier. Mr. Woodruff stated that although he could not make promises for the Authority, he would certainly talk to the Authority Board on the Harvey's behalf.

Motion was made by Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston to authorize and approve the check lists for payment of the July bills, payroll of July 8, 1994 and also to adjourn.

The regular meeting of the Mahoning Township Board of Supervisors was held on August 8, 1994, at 6:30 PM in the meeting room of the Mahoning Township Municipal Building.

Present were Supervisors Kenneth Woodruff, William Earlston and Robert Buehner, Sr.

Also present were Jay Berthelsen, Mahoning Township Chief of Police; Nelson Young, Mahoning Zoning Officer; Arthur Peters, Mahoning Township Solicitor; Mary Ann and Thomas Landi, Mahoning Township residents; Donna Marie Palombo, Press-Enterprise reporter and Bill Reeder, Danville News reporter.

The meeting was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag by the Chairman, Kenneth Woodruff.

The minutes of the previous meeting on July 25, 1994, were read and approved as read.

The Chairman read the Treasurer's Report showing a balance on hand as of July 31, 1994 of \$10,378.10. On motion of Mr. Earlston and seconded by Mr. Buehner, the report was received.

Mr. Young presented his report indicating that permits for the month of July, 1994, were issued for a total value of \$732,700.00. The fees collected for the permits totaled \$957.50. He also reported that he received an application for a Planning Module on Myers Road, which he could not submit to the Supervisors, since it had no name on it and no plot plan. The application had been turned into the Township Tax Office and given to him by Mr. Hagenbuch, Township Tax Receiver.

Under old business, Mr. Peters presented a draft of franchise agreement with CATV Services, Inc. He requested the Supervisors to review the draft and inform him of any changes they wanted made.

Mr. Peters also stated that he is pursuing a course of action that can be taken to curtail the distribution of unwanted newspapers that are distributed throughout the township and are thrown on lawns, driveways and township right-of-ways.

Chief Berthelsen made a report on police activities and the number of investigations made by his department.

The Chairman reported that the Montour County Commissioners were seeking funds to cover the cost of bringing Woodbine Lane up to PennDOT specifications so that it can be turned over to Mahoning Township.

The Chairman also read a letter from the Danville Area School District requesting that the Township share the cost of a crossing guard at the Mahoning- Cooper Elementary School. On motion of Mr. Earlston and seconded by Mr. Buehner the request was rejected since it had not been budgeted. Also the Supervisors objected to being given an assessment by the school district.

Under new business the Chairman told the board that he had been advised that the Rescue Chemical Company was driving its tank truck which still had "Mahoning Township" lettering on the truck. Mr. Peters advised the Board to instruct their Secretary to write a letter to the Rescue Chemical Company stating that "Mahoning Township" must be removed from the truck since it is no longer authorized to represent Mahoning Township.

The Chairman read a letter from Jean Knouse, Director of the Danville Area Community Center requesting a donation. On motion of Mr. Buehner seconded by Mr. Earlston the supervisors will budget an amount in the 1995 budget for the center.

Mary Ann Landi reported to the board that the stream running under her property is causing erosion of the foundation and also the bank along the stream and that this has been an ongoing problem for several years. Mr. Woodruff informed her that he has scheduled contractors to get a cost estimate to correct the problem and will keep Mrs. Landi informed.

On motion of Mr. Earlston and seconded by Mr. Buehner the payment of bills and adjournment was approved.

The minutes of the previous meeting of August 8, 1994 were approved with one correction.

Report from the Police Department informed the public that two grants were received by the Department. The first will allow four hours per man training with pepper mace, the second allows sixteen hours per man baton training.

Zoning Officer reports that the Planning Commission met this evening at 5:15 PM to review the plans for phases 2 and 3 for The Meadows at Maria Joseph Manor. The project would involve moving one road slightly north. Since all other necessary boards have granted approval, the Planning Commission also approves and recommends that the Board of Supervisors accept the revision. Mr. Buehner motioned in favor of accepting the Planning Commissions recommendations, Mr. Earlston seconded.

After lengthy review of the four bids received for the new pumper fire truck ranging in price from \$205,000 to \$244,000, the truck committee made their recommendation to the Board of Supervisors, to accept the third lowest bid from Pierce Fire Apparatus of Appleton, Wisconsin, which was submitted by Wayne Viequt of Domestic Fire Equipment at \$227,068. This bid best met the needs of the Fire Department and also offers superior craftsmanship.

The lowest bid and second lowest bid submitted from Central State Fire Apparatus and Glick Fire Equipment respectively, were declined due to substantial discrepancies and irregularities meeting the bid specifications. Central State's proposal did not include necessary information requested, and Domestic did not comply with length requirements. Mr. Buenner motioned in favor of accepting the recommendations of the truck committee and awarding the bid to Pierce, Mr. Earlston seconded the motion.

Henry Eyer, Jr. of the truck committee explained that at this point, we are looking toward a delivery date of either April, May or June of 95, at which time payment will be made by three entities; \$175,000 from the township tax fund, \$40,000 from the Firemen's Relief Fund and the remainder from the membership of the East End Fire Company.

Upon delivery, once the pumper has been put into service, the Department would like to put up for sale their used 1980 pumper truck with proceeds going to the Fire Apparatus Fund. Since the pumper is titled to the East End and equipment titled solely to the company has not previously been bid in conjunction with the

Board of Supervisors, Mr. Eyer questioned whether or not the Board would want to be involved in the sale of the old pumper. Solicitor Peters suggested that the board take this under advisement to decide at a later date, once it can be determined where the funds came from to purchase the 1980 pumper.

OLD BUSINESS: Letter, sent "Certified" "Return Receipt Requested" to Rescue Chemical Company requesting the "Mahoning Township" lettering be removed from all trucks, was picked up by Rescue, as we received our card back in the mail Friday acknowledging same. Also, our Police Chief is working with the Department of Transportation to check the tags on these trucks.

CATV Franchise agreement is also in the works, Solicitor Peters confirmed that the Board of Supervisors had requested no changes to the ordinance as it was presented to them by him at a previous meeting, and the Board confirmed their approval as presented.

Solicitor also remains in the process of preparing an ordinance to prevent distribution of unwanted newspapers.

One estimate has been retained to repair the stream at Boyer's Market, per Mrs. Landi's request. That estimate has been forwarded to Geisinger and we are waiting to hear from them.

NEW BUSINESS: Danville Borough Secretary, Tom Graham requests allocating funds to aid in the maintenance of the Hess and Hartman Recreational Areas, both of which are owned by Danville Borough, but are made available to all Montour County residents and Riverside Borough residents. Consideration will be given to this request during preparation of our 1995 budget.

A quote on the township's small equipment, buildings, automobiles and trucks has been received from Associated Insurance Management. The quote is \$1 less that that of our current insurance carrier H A Thomson. The board being of the opinion that we should deal locally motioned in favor of changing our insurance over to Associated Insurance Management, motion made by Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston.

Mr. Woodruff has attempted to secure several quotes for line painting, however, has received only one, wherein the price is determined by double or single line painting. With school scheduled to begin and early morning fog, it is necessary to have this done immediately for safety purposes, and although no decision was made as to double or single lining, motion was made by Mr. Earlston to accept the proposal of, and have the work done by Interstate Road Marking Corporation, Mr. Buehner seconded. Mr. Woodruff will contact them tommorrow morning to schedule the work.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Addressing the Board of Supervisors, Pete Rickert identifying himself as the Staff Representative for Council 86 AFSCME, affiliate of the AFL-CIO, stated that he had receive more than thirty percent designee cards from the employees of Mahoning Township indicating interest in AFSCME becoming the bargaining unit for the employees. Mr. Rickert requests joint certification with the board to eliminate the balloting and election process.

Mr. Woodruff explained that the street department currently have a contract, and question Henry Eyer as to when the contract comes up for renewal. Mr. Eyer said that we are in the first year of a three year contract. Mr. Rickert stated that he wanted it to be clear that Labor Relations does not recognize the existance of a contract drawn up after 1970 by a group with no bargaining agent. He stated that if the Board chooses to not act in joint certification, he would continue the process and petition the Labor Relations Board to begin the election process.

Mr. Buehner question Mr. Rickert as to what percentage of designee cards were

received and he was told that 99% were returned by the employees.

Mr. Woodruff advised Mr. Rickert, as well as our solicitor, that a special meeting has been called for Tuesday, August 23, 1994 at 3 PM regarding personnel matters. He also stated that the next regular meeting of the board will be held September 12, 1994. The board will take this matter under advisement and will entertain consideration of the matter for their next regular meeting of September 12, 1994.

Mr. Earlston motioned in favor to authorize and approve payment of the bills for August 1994, payroll of August 19, 1994 and also to adjourn, Mr. Buehner seconded.

Numerous seminars and workshops are being offerred through a variety of different agencies and Mr. Earlston so moved that those interested in attending any of the upcoming training session be able to do so, Mr. Buehner seconded the motion.

Mr. Buehner motion, Mr. Earlston seconded having bore hole testing done by Alvin Swank of Elysburg to determine depth for repairing the area falling away on Bald Top Road. Several companies have been contacted to do the work, however, the only one available is that of Alvin Swank. No price for the testing is available at this time, the cost will not exceed or even come close to the \$10,000 limit whereby, the project would have to be put out for bid. The day testing is scheduled to be done, Bald Top Road will have to be closed, the newspaper will be contacted prior to that date so that area residents are aware of the closing and can choose alternate routes of travel.

An all purpose saw for cutting amiesite is needed by the Street Department. Mr. Earlston motioned in favor of making the purchase. Mr. Woodruff stated that three quotes have been obtained, lowest of which is from Clark's Garden Center at \$1,145, Mr. Buehner motioned in favor of purchasing the saw from the low bidder, Mr. Earlston seconded the motion.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Pete Rickert, representative from AFSCME requested a response from the Board of Supervisors as to whether or not they wish to join in joint certification with the township employees who wish to unionize.

Mr. Woodruff read from a statement on behalf of the board saying that they are opposed to outside third party negotiations, as our employees are currently under a three year legally binding contract. Mr. Rickert stated that he has the required number of green cards, and as the labor board gives no merit to agreements entered into, such as the one prepared and entered into by our street department, he will petition the labor board to set up an election and will continue with the process.

On the advice of our solicitor, the board formally motioned not to enter in joint certification with the union, motion made by Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston.

Matt Laidecker, Surveyor for the Edgewood Development explained that the development or additional lots to the development have prompted a letter from DER addressed to the Board of Supervisors stating that once again DER has determined that wetlands exist on the property. The property was surveyed in 1993 and it was determined at that time that there were no wetlands present.

Mr. Peters will contact Richard Adams of the DER before we can proceed on this matter, however, so that the project can proceed without limiting the construction time, Mr. Laidecker requests that while we work to resolve this snag, arrangements be made to hold the Planning Commission meeting for final approval of the additional lots to Edgewood. Mr. Young explained that the Board does not like to set up a meeting with the Planning Commission, until all of the necessary paperwork and other agencies approvals have been obtained, however, since the Board of Supervisors agreed to Mr. Laidecker's request formally by motion of Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston to go ahead and schedule the meeting of the Planning Commission, Mr. Young will set up the meeting and Attorney Peters will contact DER to get this situation worked out.

Mr. Earlston motioned in favor of authorizing and approving the bills lists of September 1994 for the bills, payroll of September 2, 1994, and also to adjourn, Mr. Buehner seconded.

Zoning Officer reported fees collected for August in the amount of \$106 for a total value of permits issued at \$78,800. Mr. Young also stated that the Planning Commission met September 20, 1994, reviewed and approved final plans for the Edgewood Development. The Planning Commission recommends that the Board of Supervisors also approve the plans. Montour County Township Officials Association has scheduled their annual convention to be held at the DeLong Fairgrounds, Tuesday, October 25, 1994 at 6:00 PM.

Trinity United Methodist Men's Group has requested on site use of the chipper, as they embark on a project to enhance the wood lot on their church property and install an educational nature trail to be used by the community, as well as public schools and civic groups for field trips or science study. Mr. Buehner stated that since this would be an improvement to the township and would also benefit the community, he would be in favor of same, Mr. Earlston agreed. Since all were in agreement, the board felt that no formal motion was necessary, however, group will be notified in writing, and a request will be made to find out what date the group plans to use the chipper.

Resolution accepting Deeds of Dedication for Woodhill Drive were adopted by motion of Mr. Earlston, second Mr. Buehner. Mr. Woodruff stated that he and Zoning Officer, Nelson Young, walked this road several times, and it has since been repaired and paved and he feels is in proper order to be accepted by the township.

Resolution accepting Deeds of Dedication for Enterprise Lane, situate within the Woodbine Industrial Park, were also adopted by motion of Mr. Earlston, second Mr. Buehner. Concerns regarding a valve in the road, were checked by Mr. Woodruff and Mr. Thomas Harris of the Mahoning Township Authority, however, no problem was found with same, and an accompanying agreement guarantees that any damage done through construction, will be repaired by individuals or companies named therein said agreement. The agreement also states that the road is guaranteed through one year frost cycle, as requested by the Board of Supervisors.

The Board, wanting to review all proposals for compliance with our specifications set forth, stated that they would be prepared to take action with regard to the bids at our next regular meeting on Monday, December 26, 1994.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Charles Shuitz of Classic Reality presented a proposal on behalf of his client, a buyer/broker out of Augusta, Georgia, who purchases properties from New York to Texas, and who remains anonymous. As explained to the board, this generic brand contract, used for the numerous purchases of real estate could be altered to meet the needs of the board, basically, however, it offers \$190,000 for the purchase of the township's corner parcel of land, which includes the municipal building, the police station and the lot behind the municipal building, an approximate 1.7 acre tract of land. Other information made available was that this client has retained Attorney Mike Dennehy to represent him for this purchase. Mr. Shuitz stated that this contract had been presented to the board for review, after which they may wish to counter offer.

Mr. Woodruff stated that the sale of township property would have to be put out for bid, we would also need to obtain formal appraisals and court approval as advised by our solicitor. In his opinion, and so as not to lead someone on, Mr. Woodruff stated that at the price offered, it would cost the township money to relocate. Mr. Buehner then stated that he would not be in favor of selling this parcel as it is a central location and is convenient for our residents. Our Police Chief agreed, that for his purposes and that of his department, we do have an ideal location.

The Board would like an opportunity to discuss this offer with their legal counsel, who will then be in contact with Mr. Shuitz, however, as stated by both Mr. Woodruff and Attorney Peters, it is highly unlikely that a counter offer will be forthcoming on our part.

David & Debra Harvey of Reedy Street, who sufferred a loss from water damage on June 17, 1994, when a water line broke on Reedy Street, sending water flowing through their foundation and filling their basement causing approximately \$2,500 worth of damage to the contents of same. Since the time of this loss, the Harvey's have tried to recover their damages, but to no avail.

Attorney Peters, who is also the solicitor for the Mahoning Township Authority, just today, advised the Harvey's that the Authority's insurance carrier has for the third time declined payment of this claim. As a Board of Supervisors, we have no legal recourse at this time, as the Authority's carrier has ruled that they are not responsible, and in the event that a suit would be instituted by the Harvey's against the Authority, they, the insurance company, would defend on behalf of the Authority, but would not make an offer to settle.

Although, as stated by Mr. Woodruff, he does sympathize with the Harvey's, and he has gone before the Authority Board on their behalf prior to this evening, he again reiterated that they are a separate entity, and as such, we have no jurisdiction over them, however, he did say that he would again attend the meeting of the Authority with the Harvey's and would speak on their behalf.

The inside light on the Police Station sign needs to be replaced and will be fixed by the Street Department at the request of Mr. Buehner.

Mr. Woodruff stated that we have request P.P. & L. place one street light on Palmer Drive for the residents of that street.

NEW BUSINESS: Emergency Management seminar is scheduled for Wednesday at Genetti's in Williamsport.

The Board requests that a letter expressing their disappointment be sent to the County Commissioners with regard to the many Montour County offices closing to relocating to Columbia County, they feel that Montour County is giving away our identity.

Mr. Woodruff informed Solicitor Peters that the amendment to our traffic ordinance, in order to erect "No Parking" signs at the end of North Glenbrook and North Huntington would no longer be required, since fire hydrants have been installed at the end of these streets.

Attorney Peters distributed copies of a proposed amendment to the Peddler's Permit Ordinance, which had been requested by the Chief of Police some time ago and would require any group soliciting within Mahoning Township to obtain a photo identification. Attorney Peters suggested

that a termination period or expiration date for the permit also be included in the ordinance. Along with the copies distributed to the supervisors for their perusal, a copy was left for the Chief to go through, Mr. Peters will wait to hear from Chief Berthelsen before proceeding with this amendment.

Mr. Woodruff announced that the Department of Environmental Resources has sent word today that the township will receive a grant to start up a recycling program in the amount of \$41,326. The grant will cover 90% of the cost on our chipper, which has recently been given a real work out chipping Christmas trees collected by the township. Mr. Woodruff commended the work of the dedicated volunteers, who make up the recycling committee, as their efforts made it possible to secure the grant for Mahoning Township.

As Civil Defense Directors, Mr. Earlston advised that he and Mr. Woodruff would be attending a two-day seminar on Emergency Management March 11 and 12, 1995. Reservations and registration will be taken care of by the secretary.

Mr. Buehner motioned in favor of authorizing and approving the checks on the bill lists of January 1995 for the bills, January 6, 1995 for payroll, and also to adjourn, Mr. Earlston seconded.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Attorney Dennehy spoke on behalf of his clients, David and Deb Harvey, who still seek to recover damages to their property, a loss of approximately \$3,000 resulting from a water main break near their home. As both, their homeowners insurance carrier and that of the Municipal Authority have refused to pay for the damage, Attorney Dennehy has now become involved, and although he thanked the Board of Supervisors for the help they have tried to provide with this problem, he does state that there is a need to set a clear statement of policy, perhaps a risk sharing policy, which would build reserves into a rate base, so that there would be liability coverage for rare breaks like this one. He also feels that the residents of Mahoning Township should know that, although this happened to the Harvey's, it could also happen to anyone of them.

Attorney Dennehy is also aware that the Board of Supervisors cannot force or pressure the Authority, a separate entity, to make settlement with the Harvey's, however, he suggests that as elected officials, who make appointments to the Authority Board, they would consider appointing members to the Board, who would be more responsive to the citizens of the township.

Finally, Attorney Dennehy stated that no one really wants to see this matter go into attigation, as litigation would certainly cost more than the actual cost of the damage, and would also affect the Authority's insurance premiums.

Mr. Buehner stated on behalf of the Board that all three, collectively and individually have approached members of the Authority on behalf of the Harvey's, and they will continue with efforts to help resolve this matter.

Don Baylor, 2408 Bloom Road, would like to have the speed limit changed from 45 MPH to 35 MPH, along Bloom Road from Kaseville Road to the Township Line. As Penn Dot has informed him that this request must come from the municipality, he respectfully requested that the Board of Supervisors make this request on his behalf, and that of other township residents.

The Board agreed that a speed limit change may make this heavily travelled road somewhat less hazardous, and will contact Penn Dot to do a study of that portion of Bloom Road.

OLD BUSINESS: Attorney Peters advised that the old dump truck has been advertised for sale with bid opening scheduled for the second meeting of April or April 24, 1995. He then presented ordinances, which were properly advertised for adoption at this evenings meeting. The first regulates and restricts outdoor fires within the township, Mr. Earlston motioned in favor of adoption, Mr. Buehner seconded. The second regulates openings and excavations in the streets in the township and the protection, refilling, resurfacing and repaving of same. NEW BUSINESS: Motion was made by Mr. Earlston, second Mr. Buehner that interested parties attend the upcoming workshop sponsored by Montour County Emergency Services. The workshop deals with Public Works Employee Hazardous Materials and is designed for persons working in activities such as road maintenance and water treatment plants.

Prices were obtained to restripe several roads in the township, lowest price obtained was from Interstate Road Marking at .075 per foot, restripe and .08 per foot on lines not already laid out, total for this project would be approximately \$2,700, and we had already budgeted \$3,000, Mr. Buehner motioned in favor of going with the lowest bid to proceed with the project, and Mr. Earlston seconded.

Guardrails in need of replacement throughout the township can be replaced at around half the cost through Medico Supply. Three quotes were obtained on used guardrails. Medico in Wilkes-Barre offers recycled rails and posts. Mr. Woodruff did go and look at the rails to be sure they are in good condition and found that they are, therefore, Mr. Buehner motioned and Mr. Earlston seconded the purchase of the guardrails from Medico. The entire replacement project should cost around \$2,500.

Piping project at an approximate cost of \$8,000 to \$9,000 would involve four areas: Maple Street to correct a run-off problem in preparation for paving, cost @ \$1,415; Bald Top to correct a cinder clogging problem, cost @ \$3,000; Bald Top to replace a leaning headwall, cost @\$2,100 and Middle Street to change a cement abutment to a catch basin, cost @\$2,000. The Board approved purchasing the pipe to make these repairs, motion in favor Mr. Earlston, second Mr. Buehner.

Mr. Woodruff explained that Penn Dot has offerred to coordinate with us and hold a Township Training Day here at the township building sometime in July, whereby other surrounding townships from a number of counties, various vendors to the township and other entities would join together for a day of workshops. Vendors and businesses would be contacted and requested to donate door prizes and food items to help defer costs. The Board granted approval, motion in favor Mr. Buehner, second Mr. Earlston.

MAHONONG TOWNSHIP SUPERVISORS MEETING March 27,1995

DISCUSSION: Interptation of the Mahoning Township suddivision and land development Ordinance of 1979, Article VI Section 603. Item 2.Water: "Where a water supply system is within three thousand (3,000) feet or, where plans approved by the Board of Supervisors provide for the installation of such public water facilities to within three thousand (3,000) feet of a proposed subdivision or land development, the Developer shall provide the subvision or land development with a complete water main supply system to be connected to the existing or proposed water main supply system in accordance with Township specifications.

INTENT: What was the intent of the ordinance and what was the significance of 3000 feet? The INTENT was to require public water for sub-divisions that have an "adequate supply in terms of pressure and supply" and not to impose a hardship if this were not the case. The language does not specify this, however, we all know that intent is not always articulated in the legal mumbo jumbo. The 3000 feet was developed because it was thought that mechanically this was the prevailing situation.

ISSUE WITH THIS ORDINANCE GENERAL:


This is an absolute rule with no provision for hardship. Depending on the interpretation of "a" public water supply system, different action plans would be implemented. What would happen if due to engineering requirements, topography or right of way requirements a solution was not feasible or available. The ordinance does not allow anything to be done. With zoning law, recourse is to request a variance to deal with the particular circumstance. The exception granted is a variance. This Ordinance does not allow for exception like in the zoning law. What I am requesting is that the supervisors consider adopting a hardship wavier as a part of the ordinance. This amendment would not guarantee a wavier, but would give the supervisors the ability to decide on a case by case basis if the hardship exists and if the wavier would adversely affect the township. It would give the developer an opportunity to present his case. At my expense I would propose that I have my attorney draft such an amendment and forward it to the township solicitor for his review and recommendation.

ISSUES REGARDING QUAIL HOLLOW (proposed development): Construct 21 single family homes located on Red Lane Currently a farm house spring fed pond.

ZONING: Agriculture-Forest 1 acre minimum density.

TOPOGRAPHY: Quail Hollow is situated above the current water supply elevation, therefore not permitting a gravity flow of water. Sewerage is not a problem.

WATER SUPPLY: The water supply line that flows from the wells located at Montgomery Village, on Kaseville Road and turns onto Red Lane is "the water supply "within the 3000 feet requirement. This line is the feed line for the township water tanks. In a meeting with the Water Authority engineers and Tom Mertz it was determined that we could not access water from this line. The issues dealt with pressure and pump house location. Water lines and a pump station would have to be constructed starting at the water tower and running along Red Lane until it reached Quail Hollow approximately 4200 feet. This is beyond the 3000 feet requirement. What was the intent?

#### Gentlemen:

Pursuant to the Thursday, March 30, 1995 meeting attended by Ken Woodruff, John Mailleue, Thomas Mertz and myself, I would like to address several misunderstandings of James Barabarich regarding water service to his Quail Hollow Development.

The statement of Mr. Barbarich that the booster pump station he would be required to construct is beyond the 3000' limit of the Township's ordinance is incorrect. Water in sufficient quantity is available at the intersection of Red Lane and Kaseville Road. At our earlier meeting with Mr. Barbarich and his engineer Tom Mertz stated that he didn't think that there would be any land available for a building of this type at this intersection. He did make the offer to let Mr. Barbarich construct the pump station on Authority land on Red Lane at Well No. 4. This was not a statement that the pump station had to be constructed there.

The statement made that the existing mains couldn't handle the pressure also is incorrect. The booster pump station would not be increasing the pressure in the existing mains. It would simply be drawing water from the main at the intersection of Red Lane and Kaseville Road.

In conclusion I would like to state that there is water in sufficient quantity to supply Quail Hollow within  $3000^{\prime}$  as the ordinance requires.
